## The Rothwell top Miniature Boar

Copper alloy, approx. Ist C BC - AD Ist C

This boar, discovered in Rothwell top, Lincolnshire, one of a number of boar statues found around the U.K.

To modern eyes they look like toys but their use in prehistoric art indicates they are of ritual significance. The boar is a traditional symbol of masculinity and warrior strength.

Unlike the other examples there are no traces of fixings on the feet, meaning this boar stood alone and was not mounted on a helmet or vessel. This example is more naturalistic and cheerful then other examples, which can be stylised and fierce. It is possible they were objects designed to be offered to the gods. Did these little objects stand in for a real boar instead of animal sacrifice?

THE LONGING - JACK VETTRIANO

Jack Vettriano (1951 -)

### The Longing

Oil on Canvas, 1997

We had been aware of Jack Vettriano's work for many years and had followed his career with interest. We had, of course, seen Vettriano's classic, iconic images that are steeped in a compelling blend of nostalgia, escapism and romanticism and which perhaps explains his global appeal but for us, it is the narrative quality of Vettriano's edgier works that attracted us most.

Vettriano has an extraordinary skill to create mood and narrative in a manner which draws in the viewer, even when there is only a single character in the composition, which is the case with 'The Longing'. He captures a moment which hints at what the narrative both before and after that moment, might be but ultimately leaving it to the viewer to decide. In 'The Longing', whilst we see just a lone woman in the composition, there is a strong sense of another character that is oddly present because of his absence. Vettriano lights his paintings like a master cinematographer and we were not surprised to discover that he counts David Lynch's 'Blue Velvet' and Peter Greenaway's 'The Cook, The Thief, His Wife and Her Lover' as two of his favourite films. In works like 'The Longing', it seemed so fitting that Vettriano should name two film directors as being of particular influence on him and responsible for informing his use of colour and dramatic lighting for dramatic effect.

We first saw 'The Longing' when it was featured in last year's Retrospective of Vettriano's work at Kelvingrove Art Gallery and we were blown away by the accumulative effect of his story-telling ability. Each room had a distinctly different mood but the common denominator was the master story-telling throughout. When the opportunity to acquire an original presented itself to Matt and I, we decided that 'The Longing' would be a great first acquisition as it was so distinctively the work of Vettriano and exploring one of his potent themes, the power of attraction and love. We are delighted to be able to loan the painting to the Lincoln Gallery as it is important to us that as many members of the public be able to continue to enjoy it as much as we do.

When I look at this painting I see a woman longing for her husband.

He is absent from the painting although he is represented by a suit.
